KNOW THE FACTS

- Alzheimer's is not a normal part of aging and 1 in 3 seniors dies with Alzheimer's or another dementia.
- It kills more than breast cancer and prostate cancer combined.
- Alzheimer's worsens over time.
- There is no current cure, but treatments and research studies are available.

KNOW THE SIGNS

- Memory loss that disrupts daily life
- Challenges in planning or problem solving
- Diffculty with familiar tasks
- Confusion
- Trouble understanding images or spatial relationships
- Difficulty speaking or writing
- Misplacing things and losing ability to retrace steps
- Changes in mood or personality
